WHY ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL IS SO IMPORTANT

If a child of compulsory school age is registered at a school it is essential that they attend their school regularly and maintain a pattern of good attendance throughout their school career

Excellent attendance at school is important to allow a child or young person to fulfil their potential

Below are just some of the key reasons why it is so important children attend school:

- ♣ To learn
- ♣ To have fun
- ♣ To make new friends
- ♣ To experience new things in life
- ♣ To develop awareness of other cultures, religion, ethnicity and gender differences
- **♣** To achieve
- ♣ To gain qualifications
- ♣ To develop new skills
- ♣ To build confidence and self-esteem
- ♣ To have the best possible start in life

If schooling is to be effective, regular attendance is a prerequisite, and securing it must be a high priority for all concerned"

PUNCTUALITY

- ♣ All our pupils are expected to be on morning lines by 8:35 at the latest
- → If a pupil is late, they should report straight to form registration which runs from 8:40 am 9:00 am
- ♣ If your child is going to be late to school, it is important that you
 phone us and explain the reason why
- Lateness is regularly monitored and persistent lateness will lead to sanctions

FAMILY HOLIDAYS

- ♣ You can demonstrate your commitment to your child's education by not taking holidays during term time
- ♣ Any child or young person who is absent from school due to a holiday will miss out on important learning and will fall behind with their school work
- ♣ In each Academic Year there are only a maximum of 190 statutory school days this allows plenty of time for holidays to be arranged outside term time
- ♣ Avoid taking family holidays during the school term
- ♣ Term time holidays and prolonged absence may result in the school issuing a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN)

Holidays taken during term time will be categorised as an unauthorised absence





HOW PARENTS CAN HELP

- Lestablish a good routine in the mornings and evenings so your child is prepared for the school day ahead
- ★ Make sure your child goes to school regularly and follows the school rules
- Lessure your child arrives at school on time not late.
- ♣ Arrange dental and medical appointments outside school hours when possible
- ♣ Always inform the school if your child is absent due to illness this should be followed up with a written note when your child returns to school
- ♣ Take family holidays outside term time
- (Including homework)
- Attend parent evenings and school events
- ♣ Praise and reward your child's achievements at school
- ♣ Always support school staff in their efforts to control difficult or challenging behaviour
- ♣ Discuss any problems or difficulties with the school staff are there to help and will be supportive

EVERY SCHOOL DAY COUNTS

Every single day a child is absent from school equates to a day of lost learning

95% Attendance	9 Days of Absence	Satisfactory
90% A ttendance	19 Days of Absence	Poor
85% Attendance	28 Days of Absence	Very Poor
80% Attendance	38 Days of Absence	Unacceptable
75% Attendance	46 Days of Absence	Unacceptable

Pupil Absence

If your child is absent, you must contact us by 9:00am on the first day of absence; and then on a daily basis, if applicable. When using a mobile, can you please ensure that there is sufficient signal to leave a coherent message

Medical Appointments

Medical appointment cards/letters must be brought into school prior to appointments, if possible. Please hand cards/letters to Mrs Bezani or reception

Holiday Request Forms

Holiday request forms must be handed in to Mrs Bezani at the school





For some parents, 90% may seem like an acceptable level of attendance, but the reality is that 90% attendance means that your child will miss half a school day each week or 19 days of school during the school year – that's nearly 4 school weeks

The Law

The Education Act of 1996 states that for all children aged 5-16 years who are registered at a school, it is the responsibility of parents or carers to ensure that they attend on a regular basis

The law states that children should only be absent from school if they are ill, have a medical or dental appointment, or they have a recognised day of religious observance. As a school, we will of course be sensitive to the fact that there may be serious illness or bereavement in a family, and we will work closely with the pupil and their family in supporting them in such cases

Truancy

Police officers have the power to remove truants from the streets. This means that, if your child is out and about when they should be in school, a Police Officer can approach them and escort them back to school



The Core Subject Indicator (CSI) is a combination of attainment in English or Welsh first language, mathematics and science.










